
In 1973, the Texas legislature combined the previously Official State Holidays of Robert E. Lee's and Jefferson Davis's birthdays into a single "Confederate Heroes Day" to honor all who had served the Southern Cause. Confederate Heroes' Day commemorates those who died fighting for the Confederate States of America during the American Civil War. An Official State Holiday in Texas, Confederate Heroes' Day falls annually on January 19th—the birthday of Robert E. Lee.

Robert Edward Lee, the son of Revolutionary War officer Henry "Light Horse Harry" Lee III, was born on January 19th, 1807. Lee was a top graduate of the United States Military Academy and an exceptional officer and military engineer in the United States Army for 32 years. During this time, he served throughout the United States, distinguished himself during the Mexican-American War, and served as Superintendent of the United States Military Academy. He was also the husband of Mary Anna Custis Lee, adopted great-granddaughter of George Washington. Lee was second-in-command of the 2nd Cavalry Regiment in Texas in 1855. He served under Colonel Albert Sidney Johnston at Camp Cooper, Texas: their mission was to protect settlers from attacks by the Apache and the Comanche. Lee served as the Commander of the Army of Northern Virginia and later as General in Chief of the Armies of the Confederate States. He surrendered them to Grant on April 9, 1865. Lee died on October 12th, 1870 at the age of 63.
