HOME OF LAST TEXAS CONFEDERATE GOVERNOR PENDLETON MURRAH (1963)--1207 South Washington, Marshall

1824-1865. Born in South Carolina. Successful lawyer and businessman in Marshall. Elected to Texas legislature in 1857. At start of Civil War, served as colonel 14th Texas Cavalry. Governor 1863-65, the most trying years of the Confederacy. Debt, need, inflation, lawlessness, 74,000 dependents of soldiers, and Confederate demands for more men and supplies, all plagued his tenure. Conditions at time are shown by fact that cake served at his inaugural state dinner was made of corn meal. Early in his term, the South was split in two by loss of the Mississippi River. Texas became the main source of supply, food, and arms for the western half.

As it became more apparent that the cause was doomed, conflict increased among the military, civilians, and state authorities. Gov. Murrah, strong for states' rights, believed Texas' safety and needs should be first. The early war years had taken many men from the state with remaining state troops on a 2000 mile hostile frontier border and a coastline threatened on all sides by Indians, outlaws and federal invasion. Both the Confederacy and Texas passed draft laws for badly needed men. Murrah contended state law paramount and held troops until needed to stop invasion. At war's end, ill and knowing death was near, refusing to surrender, put on his old gray uniform, mounted his old war horse, and rode away, dying in Mexico. A memorial to Texans who served the Confederacy.

Heartsill and the W.P. Lane Rangers first met up with Captain Leroy Moncure Nutt and his unit the Red River Rangers from the Shreveport/Caddo Parish area of NW LA., shortly after arriving at Ft. Hindman / Arkansas Post in November 1862 as both Cavalry units worked together in scouting the Arkansas and Mississippi River Banks watching the Union Navy moving down the Mississippi River to Vicksburg. For days 4000 Confederates held off 70,000 Union Troops. When the Arkansas Post fell on Jan. 11th, 1862. Both Ranger units were shipped to Camp Butler, Ill. as POW's and the officers went to Camp Chase, Ohio. They suffered thru a severe winter and sickness. He records in his diary that on April 4, 1863 That Mrs. Nutt arrived here today from Louisville, KY. Where she succeeded in procuring a good supply of clothing for all the prisoners confined here and she paid particular attention to the wants of Captains Nutt's, Denson's and Richardson's companies, just here a difficult question arises in my mind, is Mrs. Nutt a human being? If so, what can an Angel be? it is enough to make the great majority of our people blush for shame and hide their faces in confusion to see what this noble woman has done, she has come alone, from her home in Louisiana to this place, going by to see her husband Captain Nutt, at Camp Chase Ohio, not only came to see the men of her husband's Company, but comes as a ministering Angel to us all, and has worked hard, not only for one Company, but for the entire number of prisoners here, her praise is on every tongue, and her kind actions are indelibly engraved upon the heart of every prisoner, at the same time she commands the admiration and respect of our enemies.

At her Sanibel home on Monday night, Jan. 28, 1914, the soul of Mrs. Letitia La Fon Ashmore Nutt passed to the higher life. Mrs. Nutt was born in Woodford county, Ky, seventy-eight years ago and comprised in her

personality, the rich experience of the luxurious antebellum days, the harrowing period of the Civil War, together with the noble development of the New South. Possessed of a rare

Possessed of a rare type of beauty, her deep intellectuality and strong personality, combined with wealth and position, rendered her a social power. After a brilliant girlhood she became the wife of LeRoy Moncure Nutt of Virginia. The marriaage was solemnized in New Orleans. Bishop Polk (afterwards the "Warrior" Bishop) officiated. The fruit of this union was three daughters:, Cordie and Letitia Nutt, and Mrs. Nannie Nutt Holt. At the first tocsin of war, when her gallant husband warmly espoused the confederate cause, Mrs. Nutt followed him with enthusiasm. Captain of the Shreveport Rangers, he served in the trans-Mississippi department until made prisoner at the fall of Arkansas Post. His devoted wife followed him to prison. Upon his exchange, he served with great gallantry in the army of Tennessee, where again she shared his dangers. When, later, he became captain of the Independent Scouts, reporting only to Gen. Joseph E. Johnston, her devotion to the cause was even more pronounced. Adored by men and officers alike, she hovered ever near the army, rendering valuable service to the Confederacy. Her war record is remarkable, in spirit, she was co-equal with the warrior, of whom his brigade company, and give them the first fire." About 25 years ago, Mrs. Nutt, then a widow, came with her daughters and her brother, Capt. Jas. M. Ashmore, to Sanibel. There they created a home and became identified with the intellectual development of the section. After gallantly braving the hardships of pioneer life in Lee county, after long years spent in pacting the youth of our community, after shedding the genial rays of homeintality into many

Her wonderful intellect and strong personality have left an impress upon all who knew her. The Letitia Ashmore Nutt Chapter of U.D.C. (Ft. Myers, Fla.) will perpetuate her loyalty to the South. Flowers placed in fame's treasured urn by the hand of love can never fade. By the side of the soldier brother near the home both helped to build, lie the mortal remains of this noble woman. There soothed by the grand symphony of old ocean may they rest till the Ark-Angel's trumpet bid our Dixie's heroes rise, and in that unrefined "Hereafter" obtain glorious victory. 

How Do I Join The Sons of Confederate Veterans?

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved. Membership in the Sons of Confederate Veterans is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either lineal or collateral family lines and kinship to a veteran must be documented genealogically. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet Membership.
